KIRTLAND'S WARBLER SIGHTED IN FLORIDA

This photo of a banded Kirtland's Warbler was taken by Barbara Keskinen around 11 am on 24 April, 2009, in Lori Wilson Park, Cocoa Beach, Florida. She thought the members of Michigan Audubon might be interested to see it. According to Dave Ewert, a biologist with The Nature Conservancy in Michigan who studies the birds in Michigan as well as in their Bahamian wintering grounds, the following information was gleaned from the bird's bands.



"The superb photo of the Kirtland's Warbler is very exciting. The probability of finding a color banded Kirtland's Warbler during migration is incredibly low so congratulations to Barbara and Phyllis for a phenomenal sighting. You could almost read the band combination.

The bird photographed is a male Kirtland's Warbler that was banded in Oscoda County, Michigan (the "Big Creek" site), during the 2008 breeding season by Sarah Rockwell, a University of Maryland graduate student.

Thanks to all for this very valuable information! We will be looking for this bird on its Michigan territory to see if we can establish how long it takes to get from Florida to Michigan."

MICHIGAN AUDUBON SPECIALTY TOURS

PIPING PLOVER MONITORS NEEDED

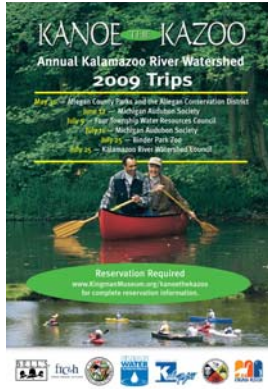
Two opportunities are available for contributing to Piping Plover conservation efforts in Michigan.

Volunteers are invited to spend a weekend on North Manitou Island to monitor piping plover nests. Volunteer duties will be to keep predators away, observe incubation, and watch for abandonment. Stay at the bird camp which includes kitchen and sleeping tents. Bring clothes, sleeping bag, and food. Preferred shifts are Friday morning thru Monday morning; shorter stays are possible. Time is available to explore the island. The National Parks Service will arrange a no-cost shuttle for you. For more information contact Lake Bluff at 723.4042 or email lakebluff@charter.net.

The Nature Conservancy is also looking for volunteers to help monitor Piping Plover nests and chicks in various locations across the Upper Peninsula: Grand Marais and Vermilion on Lake Superior, Gulliver, Escanaba, Indian Point, and Pte. Aux Chenes/Brevort on Lake Michigan. In addition to surveying the beaches and monitoring located nests, volunteers may also provide public outreach support and watch for possible predators such as gulls, ravens, and merlins. Volunteers are needed during June and July, and housing may be provided at some of the sites. Contact Lisa Niemi at lniemi@tnc.org or 906-225-0399 ext. 4014.



TWO CANOE OUTINGS PLANNED



Michigan Audubon is offering two Birding by Canoe/Kayak programs this summer. Both programs are part of the Kanoethe Kazoo event. All participants need to provide their own canoe/kayak. Pre-registration is required.

The first program will be held on June 12 (rain date June 13) and will travel on the Kalamazoo River through the Allegan State Game Area. Participants will meet at the Allegan Dam access on Allegan Dam Rd. at 7:15 a.m. The float is approximately 3.5 miles. Species that may be seen include Cerulean Warbler, Prothonotary Warbler, both Yellow and Black-billed Cuckoos, plus a wide variety of waterfowl and numerous wetland and shore birds.

The second float will take place on July 11 (rain date July 12) on Fish Lake in Barry County. Participants will meet at the Fish Lake Public Access on Guernsey Lake Rd. at 7:45 a.m. The float is approximately 2 miles. We expect to see herons and various waterfowl species, along with Osprey, Marsh Wren, Common Yellowthroat, as well as many species of turtles, frogs, snakes, and mammals.

Workshop participants will learn how to construct and maintain nest boxes for a variety of wildlife species, such as bluebirds, kestrels, screech owls, wood ducks, and swallows. Program takes place at Baker Lodge (East sanctuary entrance). Participants need to bring their own hammer.
