Christmas Bird Count

Sat., Dec. 20th, Dawn to Dusk

On Saturday, December 20th, Macomb Audubon will host its 50th Christmas Bird Count (aka "CBC"), which is part of the nation's 125th annual count of the same name. We're looking for volunteers to participate by spending that day counting all the birds present within an assigned area. Participants of all birding experience levels are welcome, as we all help each other and work as a team.

After the full day of counting, we'll meet at 5:00 p.m. at the Stony Creek Nature Center for a warm meal and group tally to combine everyone's species counts. Consider bringing a shareable food or drink item to the tally such as soup, chili, dessert, or non-alcoholic beverage. Please bring your own bowl and spoon as well.

Sign-up sheets for the CBC will be available at upcoming membership meetings (see page 1 for meeting details). At the December meeting, area leaders will receive their information packets, which include maps of the assigned area, signs to put in your car windows, and official tally forms. Consider splitting the cost of gas that day with the other members of your group. If you wish to participate and are unable to attend the meetings to sign up and/or get your packet, or if you have any other questions, please contact our CBC coordinator, Brian McGee, at brianmcgee@wowway.com
